**BE SMART ONLINE**

**S SAFE** Keep your personal information safe. When chatting or posting online don't give away things like your full name, password or home address. Remember personal information can be seen in images and videos you share to. Keep them safe to keep yourself safe.

**M MEET** Meeting up with someone you only know online, even a friend of a friend, can be dangerous as this person is still a stranger. If someone you only know online ever asks you to meet up, for personal information or for photos/videos of you then tell an adult straight away and report them together on [www.thinkuknow.co.uk](http://www.thinkuknow.co.uk).

**A ACCEPTING** Think carefully before you click on or open something online (e.g. links, adverts, friend requests, photos) as you never know where they may lead to or they may contain viruses. Do not accept something if you are unsure of who the person is or what they've sent you.

**R RELIABLE** You cannot trust everything you see online as some things can be out of date, inaccurate or not entirely true. To find reliable information compare at least three different websites, check to books and talk to someone about what you have found.

**T TELL** Tell a trusted adult if something or someone ever makes you feel upset, worried or confused. This could be if you or someone you know is being bullied online. ## EYFS – Miss Anderson and Mrs Dobson

### NURSERY

This week, in nursery, the children have been learning all about the weather and seasons. We have looked at the different types of weathers we experience in the different seasons, and what would be the best clothing to wear in each season. The children also learnt about the weather in different countries around the world, by watching video clips. We then enjoyed looking in the nursery garden for signs of spring. The children went on to paint some fantastic rainbows, explored ice and watched it melt, used pipettes to make rain drops and made snowmen with cloud dust.


Nursery have also been looking at different things that start with the letter 'a'.

### RECEPTION

This week, our topic books have been, 'Tadpole to Frog' and 'Frankin Frog'. The children have learnt all about the life cycle of a frog, from frogspawn to adult frog, and how the frog develops at each stage. The children have done a wonderful job at writing sentences and using our wondrous words to talk about the life cycle. We even observed some real frogspawn/tadpoles, before safely returning it to the pond.

In maths, the children have been introduced to 3D shapes. We have learnt about key features of 3D shapes, including faces, edges and corners. The children have opened up the 3D shapes into their nets to see which 2D shapes they are made up of.

The children have also recapped healthy eating. Miss Spenceley made a 'healthy' sandwich which was full of cake, marshmallows, fizzy pop and chocolate, before the children told her that it was not healthy at all! They then helped Miss Spenceley make a healthy shopping list, so she could make a real healthy sandwich next time.

Another eventful week in our Year 3+4 classroom!

We have had a great time in DT lessons, making our seasonal tarts. The first lesson involved taste-testing many different toppings; here the children could decide which topping they would like to include on their own tart. The second lesson was all hands-on-deck, where the children had a wonderful time rolling up their sleeves and chopping the vegetables, before grating some cheese to add to the top of their seasonal pastry tart. Most of the children thought they were delicious! I hope a few of them are inspired to help cook at home with their newly found cutting, peeling and grating skills.

Our Year 4 children are now in full swing, heading towards their times tables check in June. It would be really helpful if they can practice at home, using Times Table Rockstars or any other games that can be found online. They could also write a song that includes the Times Tables (rewriting lyrics to popular songs is good fun too!) The children will be making some flashcards at school soon, to use when practising, and they could make another set at home to play some games.

This term children have been getting to grips with using a racket during PE lessons, and this practice helped one of our teams reach 2<sup>nd</sup> place in the Tennis + Racquets Festival, which took place this morning. Swimming lessons are still going wonderfully, with improvements in technique and ability.

## Y5/6 – Miss Dobinson and Mrs Emery

***What object is king of the classroom? A ruler!***

This was one of Year 5&6's favourite joke from the book, 'The Boy Who Made Everyone Laugh' this week. As we have continued to read the book, we have explored Billy's emotions and debated whether or not Billy should do the 'Me, Me, Speech'. The class struggled to agree on an answer as there were so many arguments for and against the idea. Some children believed that Billy should do the speech as recommended by his speech therapist, Sue – she believes that speaking will improve his confidence. However, other children in the class believed that Billy should not do the speech because it gives more reason for his bully, William Blakemore, to ridicule him. Our understanding of the book from our reading lessons has ensured that the class have been able to write a diary entry from the perspective of Billy, using apostrophes for contractions, as well as the active and passive voice.

In maths, children in Year 5 have completed their unit of work on percentages – we learnt that the word percent means 'out of 100', which has supported us in our learning – all children have flown through the unit and are able to confidently use fractions, decimals and percentages. In Year 6, we have been learning about area and perimeter, challenging ourselves with finding the area of a triangle – we learnt that to find the area of a triangle, we just need to half the area of a rectangle! We have also been revisiting arithmetic questions in preparation for our SATs in May.

In geography this week, we explored the reason as to why the polar regions have changed over time and how this change may impact on the animal and human populations in the Arctic and Antarctic regions. This led to a very scientific question by one child, 'Why do icebergs not sink?' From this question we discussed the meaning of density and practised the movement of particles in solids, liquids and gases.

We also had a special visit from the Fire Service this week, who delivered a very informative session on how to stay safe in the community and the dangers of starting fires. The firemen answered lots of children's questions, resulting in the class having a deeper understanding of the role of the fire service and how fire's start.
