
I hope you have a wonderful half term break with your family, and I look forward to seeing you back to school on Monday 3rd March.

EYFS - Miss Anderson and Mrs Dobson

NURSERY

This week, in Nursery, we have been reading the fantastic, 'We're Going on a Bear Hunt'. The children absolutely love this story and have enjoyed re-playing the story by going on their own bear hunt through a deep cold river, thick oozy mud, a swirling snow storm and then finally, finding the bear in the cave. The children have practiced their cutting skills by making the swishy, swashy grass and have used bears to make repeating patterns. Nursery have also enjoyed taking part in Bear Hunt cosmic yoga.

RECEPTION

This week, in maths, the children have been exploring length. They have looked at appropriate measuring tools for different objects, including rulers and a meter stick. They have also had a go at measuring themselves with a ruler, by accurately lining up the object and looking at which number it stops at. They have also identified longer/shorter objects and described them in full sentences. For our final week of the 'Dinosaur World' topic, our topic book was, 'Tyrannosaurus Drip' by Julia Donaldson. Our class was very excited by this one as it is one of their favourite authors. The children have filled in missing words from sentences relating to the book and answered comprehension questions about the story, with some fantastic detail!

In our afternoon sessions we have identified similarities and differences in young and older people; shared which space in school is most important to us and why; learnt about which animals lay eggs and which animals give live birth and most excitingly observed real fossils! The children loved feeling the fossils' textures and seeing which is lighter/heavier. They even hypothesised what animal the fossil could have been.

It's been a lovely last week of dinosaurs and I hope you all have a lovely half term.

English lessons have been very exciting this week. We read the story, 'Spider Sandwiches', and this inspired us to design our own disgusting sandwich. The children were very creative with their ingredients and used a range of amazing adjectives to describe their revolting creation.

We have had such an exciting time in science, testing different materials and their properties. We investigated whether the materials could be stretched, bent, squashed and twisted. The children then tested some items of their own.

During our geography topic, we learnt about the countries that make up the UK and the seas that surround them. Some of the children even remembered the capital cities from our geography lessons last year - well done!

Our final week in this first term of Spring has been filled with lots of exciting activities.

In history we are wrapping up the Viking unit and this week we have been able to explore some of the items that the Vikings would have used; these were kindly lent to us by a local museum.

We have worked hard in R.E. to think about how Christians believe Jesus would have wanted people to live their lives, and the impact this has on charities that support those in need.

We have continued our topic of 'electricity' in science, by looking into how switches work and what we need to make a working switch.

The Year 4 children are now looking at time in maths; it would be great to see them practicing at home, by reading an analogue clock or talking about how much time has passed between any given times, or asking them, "how long until...". Year 3 have started to learn about money and how they can use different coins or notes to pay for items in shops.
