

#### EYFS – Miss Anderson and Mrs Dobson

#### **NURSERY**

This week in Nursery we have explored China and Chinese New Year; the children have learnt how each year is named after a different animal. Our home corner was transformed into a Chinese restaurant, where the children could play at making Chinese food or eating a Chinese meal. Nursery have enjoyed tasting Chinese food, using their skills to pick up noodles with chop sticks....their favourite food were the prawn crackers. The children have also made Chinese dragons and the Great Wall of China.

#### **RECEPTION**

The children in Reception have loved exploring capacity in our water tray this week. In maths we have looked at identifying full, empty and half full containers whilst experimenting with different sized spoons/containers in water. The children have also looked at measuring in length by finding an object that is the same size as their arm, and building towers the same height as dinosaurs.

Our story of the week was, 'The Dinosaur that Pooped a Planet'. The children were very enthusiastic about learning the space elements of the story and exercised their sense of humour too. They have finished/written sentences that link to the story and ordered pictures of how fossils are made.

On Wednesday, we had a Chinese food tasting session to celebrate Chinese New Year. The children learnt about the story of the animal race to determine the order of the animal years and how this year is the year of the snake.

In RE, we have looked at what it means to be part of a group and how people may wear a symbol to represent that group. We talked about clubs such as Rainbows and football teams wearing a badge to show their group. We then looked at various religious symbols and talked about how religious people may wear these symbols to represent their religion.

### Y1/2 – Mrs Garnett, Mrs Aislabie and Miss Spenceley

This week, Year 2 have completed their own set of instructions based on, 'How to Capture the Big Bad Wolf'. The children were very engaged and creative with their ideas.

In maths, Year 1 have continued to add numbers using their knowledge of number bonds to 10, while Year 2 have been learning about measure, including length in centimetres and metres, and weight using grams and kilograms.

On Tuesday, the children had a fantastic BLAST lesson. Ben set up a circuit of exercises for the children to complete for a given length of time. The children worked extremely hard and were very tired after they had completed the whole circuit!

During our geography lesson, we found out what it would be like to live near the equator, by researching the country, Uganda. The children have enjoyed learning about the climate, landmarks, native animals and food, that people who live in Uganda, eat. We made comparisons of our findings in relation to our previous learning of an Inuit culture.

#### Y3/4 - Mr Frazer and Mrs Niven

Year 3 and 4 have had a good and busy week, now that we are fully back in the flow.

In computing this week, we have continued to learn how to code, using Purple Mash, and the children have been using variables.

In PE, they have continued to learn about dance, in preparation for the gymnastics festival on 10<sup>th</sup> February.

During our music lesson, the children have been learning to rap.

In science, we have been making circuits with buzzers, motors and lights - the children are beginning to see how adding more bulbs makes them dimmer, while more batteries makes them brighter.

In writing, we are completing our '1066' non-chronological reports whilst in maths both year groups have been continuing their units from last week.

History has been the buzz of the class this week, as we had a special visitor come in to discuss local place names and talk to them about the customs of the Vikings and Anglo-Saxons. As it happens, the Vikings were more peaceful than we thought!

#### Y5/6 - Miss Dobinson and Mrs Emery


We have had a quiet week in Year 5/6 this week, as we have found relaxing music has helped us focus – especially in our writing.

This has been our final week on writing a World War 2 themed non-chronological report, with the inclusion of technical vocabulary, semi-colons and parenthesis. We have been blown away with the children's enthusiasm for writing about such a key historic event.

There has also been a big research focus this week in our science unit, evolution and inheritance, as children used the iPads to explore different animals' adaptations needed to survive in their habitat and environment. One example that we looked at as a whole class, was a polar bear; a polar bear has a large nose so that they are able to smell their prey up to 1km away.

Year 5 have aced the beginning of their fraction's unit, whereby they have been adding fractions together – all children know the steps that they need to follow; check, are the denominators the same? If not, use multiplication to convert a denominator, and then add the numerators. Year 6 are flying through their algebra unit, where we have moved on to writing algebraic expressions and solving 1-step problems. Some children wish that we could do algebra all year in maths and are looking forward to continuing the unit in secondary school!
